I also want to acknowledge the excellent team of CPSU staff members who work for you everyday.

They've had some huge wins in the past year including convincing the Government to review fixed term employment which saw thousands of

fixed term employees converted to permanent.

Between the big wins the work is often complex, emotionally draining and thankless but our staff are inspired and re-energised by seeing Members acting collectively.

Branch elections in June resulted in many new faces representing your interests on the CPSU Council. Thanks to everyone who took part in the election process.

We must always be accountable to you, the members, for our decisions and that accountability should come from an independent, informed, active Council.

Finally, thanks to all Members for re-electing Mat Johnston and I for another term.

I love working for you so be assured I'll continue to dedicate all my efforts to protecting and promoting the interests and welfare of CPSU Members.

I believe the public is very supportive of this stand as it's essential to enable the best people to remain in Tasmania.


Thankyou to Members for supporting their Union, particularly those who attended meetings or gave feedback on the many issues dealt with over the year.

campaign update - mat johnston

AS WELL as the very high profile YR@W and Public Sector Unions Wages Agreement campaigns your CPSU has run a raft of other successful campaigns throughout the past financial year.

In 2007 the CPSU kicked off the *Is It Fair?* campaign for permanency for State Servants employed on illegal rolling contracts.

As a direct result of a precedent-setting case run by the CPSU on behalf of a Member in DPIW, your union began gathering stories and evidence regarding the systemic misuse of contracts across Agencies.

We also wrote to the then Premier Paul Lennon and strongly put our case for the inception of a moratorium on fixed term employment.

Mr Lennon ceded to our demands and the moratorium was introduced to allow Agencies to lift their game.

Over the course of the moratorium several thousand State Servants who were previously precariously employed have been converted to permanent and now have some surety in their working lives

Starting with a case for one Member, the CPSU has campaigned, won and changed the lives of thousands of workers and their families for the better.

In January 2008 the *You've Earned It* campaign for payment of Award entitlements to Availability Allowances was commenced.

Over the preceding months your CPSU had noticed a pattern of non or under payment of this allowance and began designing a campaign to remedy the situation.

Again, individual Members came forward and got involved in the process.

As a result of the cases brought directly from this campaign hundreds of

thousands of unpaid entitlements were recovered for Members.

Still pending from this campaign are claims for a significant proportion of the School Executive Officers working in our education system.

Evidence is being gathered and will be presented to the Department and agreed or arbitrated in the near future.

CPSU Members can be justifiably proud of the *Is It Fair?* and *You've Earned It* campaigns.

They've involved Members, led the way for other public sector unions to follow and achieved brilliant results for workers who were being unfairly treated or shortchanged by their employer.

Without this work by the CPSU thousands of workers would still be on illegal contract arrangements or being underpaid their entitlements.

The CPSU School Administrators Advisory Forum (SAAF) has also been waging a long and difficult campaign for additional resources to keep schools operating.

The SAAF is a group of CPSU Members who've banded together to work for the good of their colleagues and profession.

They are truly a model for Member driven campaigning.

The campaign continues but will hopefully be concluded positively soon and will result in a long-overdue injection of people and funding to school administration.

Recently campaigns have been initiated in Human Services generally and in Disability Services specifically.

Youth Justice, AYDC, Disability Services, Child Protection, Housing Tasmania, Mental Health Services and other areas are all earmarked for 'reform' and serious 'restructuring'.

Without CPSU Members' involvement their direct, frontline experience will not be considered and those people in the Tasmanian community most vulnerable or at risk may miss out on vital services.

Members say reform and restructure are needed and are valuable but any changes should balance the needs of clients, workers and responsibility of government.

It'll be the job of the CPSU campaign to ensure that there is balance, the community doesn't suffer and workers are protected.

With the Tasmania Tomorrow reforms to post year 10 education moving towards commissioning in 4 colleges and all TAFEs first thing in 2009 the CPSU is working to ensure the needs of college and TAFE support staff are respected in the transition.

These reforms will usher in a new world for students and teachers but Government can't be allowed to forget the Teacher Aides, Librarians, Administrative Workers, Groundspeople, Drivers, Library Techs, Laboratory Techs and many others who keep colleges and TAFEs running.

Again, the CPSU campaign *My Job Tomorrow* is about balance and respect for workers now and into whatever the future holds for the Academy, Polytechnic and Training Authority.

We will work with Members for as long as it takes to make sure the Government gets it right for students, teachers *and* support staff.

These are just the big ones. Along with these initiatives numerous smaller scale campaigns are on the go at any given stage.

If you think there's an opportunity to mobilise Members around a hot issue in your workplace or industry let the CPSU know and we can work with you to make sure there is justice, fairness and balance.


She finds the theory interesting but says it was nice to get into a classroom and observe the organisational skills of experienced teachers first-hand.

steve sellers - cpsu delegate

CPSU DELEGATE Steve Sellers works in an area in DPIW's Information and Land Services that looks after the digital spatial transport network over the state which all stems from a long program of mapping and the various Tasmap products that are produced by this area.



Tasmania is the only state in Australia that has complete mapping of the state at 1:25,000 - which is quite an achievement.

This work is now done digitally and the data is used to create the road and track components of Tasmaps which are now produced by automated mapping techniques, many of which have been developed in-house.

There are also many attributes attached to the data that different agencies, private companies, educational institutions, consultants and private individuals make use of.

"Our data goes all over the world, for example if you use Google Maps or Google Earth the road data you see over Tasmania is sourced from our office."

When Steve's not at work he swims to keep fit and rides his motorbike for fun although with 6, 8 and 9 year old kids he does a lot less of these than he used to.

He's been involved in most aspects of motorcycle road racing in Tasmania through the Sports Riders Club of Tasmania and won the state Superbike Championship twice and held the national 600 SuperSport lap record at Baskerville.

"I raced in the Castrol 6 hour at Oran Park in Sydney as well as in the Superbike support races at the first 2 GPs at Phillip Island and numerous National Championship events but only got the odd top 10 result."

Steve was Event Director of the Tasmanian rounds of the Australian Road Racing Championships at Baskerville in '97 & '98, was a finalist in the Sports Administrator of the Year category of the 1998 Tasmanian Sports Star of the Year Awards.

He's also a past president, life member and National Councillor of Motorcycling Australia, the controlling body of motorcycle sport.

Baskerville had it's 50th anniversary race meeting in February and Steve was the

Clerk of the Course for the bike racing which meant a lot as his Dad was one of many who helped get Baskerville up and running in the first place.

"Yes, I've crashed motorbikes many times and yes, I've broken plenty of bones and lost lots of bark but riding motorbikes has got to be one of the most fun things you can do! - Go Casey!"



"Work Choices is the very best example of why it's important to belong to a union like the CPSU."

Steve believes the ease with which Work Choices legislation was going to erase the hard won conditions fought for by workers over two hundred years showed that we don't live in a benevolent world and we need to stay united and always vigilant through the work of unions.

"It's important to be a member of the CPSU because this is the union body that directly looks after us and will listen to, understand and go in to fight for our particular concerns."

Steve became a Delegate about 5 years ago as most people in his field are employed under the Technical stream and he saw that the 4 stream system didn't offer them much.

He realised that becoming active was really the only effective way to help raise and address issues and becoming a Delegate was the obvious step.

It must be in Steve's blood because his Mum told him her Dad was always going off to union meetings as an official in the railways union.

"He faced hard times fighting for the introduction of superannuation and had union members calling him a "commie" and accusing him of trying to take their hard earned money off them but we all now know superannuation was one of the union movement's greatest achievements!"



THIS LAST year has been a really exciting time for the Public Sector Unions Wages Agreement.

Union members have been and still are campaigning for a new and improved classification structure and pay parity with the rest of Australia.

We've also seen quite a few offers from Government and stop work meetings where thousands turned out around the state to vote to reject the offers and send the message they want Government to keep its pay parity promise.

Members know this is a one-off opportunity to bring public sector wages up to a fair and equitable level.

The campaign hit the road and the airwaves in the last year and we went to 10 towns around the state to talk to the community about the importance of supporting public sector workers in this campaign.

We explained that public services can't be delivered without workers and the public sector is facing a crisis if the current difficulties with recruiting and retaining staff are allowed to continue. We also saw union members star in our very successful television adverts which showed clearly that Tasmanian public sector workers are paid less to do the same work as people in other states.

Where to from here?

Members took action earlier in the year and were successful in getting a new offer from Government and as this goes to print union members are again taking industrial action in support of their claim.

We're optimistic about resolving this campaign fairly for everyone.

The department is responsible for the collection and storage of all medical information of patients who attend RHH.



She was also an author whose published work included *Dancing on the Edge of the Empire* a biography of Tasmanian Pauline Curran who married a Russian Prince to become Princess Melikoff in the 1920s and *Peace Comes Walking; The Life of Donald Groom, Quaker Peace Worker.*

Victoria also wrote *The Service Tasmania Story*, a description of the development of the one-stop-shop Service Tasmania concept, application and Service Tasmania Online.

Her work was published in various magazines including 40 Degrees South.

Victoria was given only six months to live and went into palliative care at St John's Hospital but she hung in there and then was forced to find alternative care but was lucky enough to find a place at St Ann's nursing home.

Although very happy with the care provided by St Ann's Victoria spoke out in May this year about the lack of an appropriate palliative care program in Tasmania.

"Being told 'you are never going home but you can't stay here' is very distressing."

Victoria passed away a few weeks ago and will be missed.

member profile - jennie whinam



JENNIE Whinam is DPIW's Senior Ecologist in the Vegetation Conservation Section and she's been involved in subantarctic biosecurity projects for some years and coauthored several international papers on this subject.

Jennie was recently the DPIW representative on the Macquarie Island Biosecurity Planning Group which was critical to the commencement of the Vertebrate Pests Eradication Plan for rabbits, rats and mice on the island.

She is an expert on Australasian Sphagnum peatlands and has

advised Australian and New Zealand governments on the ecology, management and restoration of peatlands and was invited to be part of the late 2007 French Polar Institute's expedition to Ile Amsterdam, part of the French Southern and Antarctic Lands.

"This expedition gave me the chance to participate in the International Polar Year program 'Aliens in Antarctica' and to gain valuable insights and identify potential risks and management strategies which will strengthen the likelihood of the Biosecurity Plan for Macquarie Island succeeding."

The second aspect of the trip was to look at the currently undescribed ecology and species taxonomy of Sphagnum peatlands on Ile Amsterdam.

Participation in the expedition gave Jennie international experience in subantarctic biosecurity as well as updating the risks for vectors and pathways for alien species introductions in the subantarctic.

"It's clear that Tasmania is well ahead of France in terms of subantarctic biosecurity procedures and my involvement helped place the risks of current procedures into an international context which should assist in developing appropriate management."

The expedition highlighted how the lack of biosecurity procedures and reserve

conservation management have led to a flora dominated by alien species.

It's especially important that biosecurity procedures be reviewed for Macquarie Island at a time when there will be increased numbers of equipment, personnel and visits associated with the vertebrate pest eradication program.

Doing research on the peatlands of Iles St Paul and Amsterdam gave Jennie the opportunity to understand the ecology of rare ecosystems that are significant at the international scale and her previous work on the susceptibility of peatlands to trampling damage will be used to produce management guidelines for these fragile ecosystems.

Jennie was also able to view the French experiment on the impacts of climate change where glass growth chambers with temperature and precipitation sensors have been installed on Ile Crozet and increased growth rates have been recorded.

"On the ship's arrival back at La Reunion I met with the Director of the French Antarctic Environment Program and he was interested to follow up conservation management and biosecurity procedures specified in the Macquarie Island Management Plan."

This was an opportunity to showcase aspects of conservation management where Tasmania is at the forefront.
